Local Coastal Community Group

The SHRA Chair and Deputy Chair, along with our local councillors and representatives from Pevensy Parish Council, the Green Party, the Sovereign Harbour Berth Holders Association, Premier Marinas and the Sovereign Harbour Trust, were invited to an evening meeting with the project team for an update and to discuss the formation of a **local coastal community group**.

The group would represent local interests, would meet with the project team at least quarterly, and their discussions on the project would be fed into the decision-making process as the project moved forward.

The meeting was very useful and interesting. The EA presented official UK data on the projected sea level rise for the coming 100 years. Although the precise height of the maximum rise is not yet able to be calculated, all the data shows that sea levels are rising and at a faster rate than ever before.

The delivery of the project work will take three main strands:

- The immediate short-term coastal flood risk management work via the 'interim' project;
- Phase 1 of the Scheme will look at the short to medium term solutions;
- The 100-year flexible strategic plan delivers solutions up to and beyond 2100.

1. The 'interim' project is a short-term piece of primarily beach management work (shingle moving) which delivers flood risk management in a very similar way to what has been done over the past 20 years in the Pevensy Bay area. Starting from 2025 this beach management work will be in place for only a few years, at most, and seeks to continue the work done over the previous decades. This initial beach work allows time for the two other more complex strands to be developed to a stage where they can be delivered on the ground.

2. The phase 1 works is the start of the Pevensy Bay to Eastbourne Scheme. This first phase looks to build upon and further develop the previous approaches used to defend the coastline. It will seek to focus on the most vulnerable locations and install new approaches which better manage the risks in response to climate change and sea level rise. This first phase of works can be expected to run for approximately 20 years, this duration will be confirmed in due course.

3. The 100-year flexible plan will layout a route to managing flood risk from the sea in the long term. The plan will allow for different choices in the future within the framework set out as we continue to respond and adapt to a changing climate. The flexible plan will allow multiple projects to be delivered, following on from the end of phase 1 works and into the future.

These three areas of work mean that the project board can focus on managing the present-day coastal flood risk, whilst also planning for potential different futures under a range of different climate change scenarios beyond 2100.

With the present-day risks in mind, the commencement of the project coincides with the end of the current beach work contract carried out by Pevensey Coastal Defence Ltd (PCDL) on behalf of the Environment Agency under a Public Private Partnership (PPP/PFI) agreement. This agreement ends in 2025 and discussions are underway on what a new agreement would look like. One thing that was made clear was that the current practice of moving shingle around from Langney Point to the North Harbour beach (the so-called “bypassing”) would need to continue for many years.

The project team hope to publish a short list of various solutions for phase 1 by the end of this year. They have been examining options such as a rock or timber revetment, rock or timber groynes, concrete walls, one large extended groyne (like Splash Point), [beach prisms](#), floating off-shore structures and several others.

The local representatives at the meeting agreed to meet with the project team again in September or early October. They also agreed that representatives from other local groups or businesses could be invited to join the group.

For our part, SHRA remains very concerned about the future of the current contract that protects our North Harbour beach, the environmental and accessibility impact on protective beach work, and any financial impact that necessary new flood defence work on the harbour infrastructure could have on residents.

The project team’s slides from their presentation at the meeting will be available soon and when they are we will let you know.

Bus Link Petition

Following a recent meeting with bus company Stagecoach, our MP, Caroline Ansell, has created a petition calling on East Sussex County Council to use some of the £41 million the government has awarded them through the Bus Service Improvement Plan to build the long-promised bus link between the South and North Harbours.

This would take the form of a dedicated, bus-only lane running at the rear of the retail park linking Atlantic Drive with Harbour Quay controlled by automatic gates or rising bollards.

The design and artwork of the seal board were done by SHRA committee member, Rajendra Pisavadia who also oversaw the printing.

The timber stand and frame have been beautifully constructed by Peter Lawrence, and varnished umpteen times by his wife, committee member Frances Lawrence. Keith, husband to SHRA Treasurer, Carol Collier, helped enormously with setting the board in place.

Now that the seal board is in place, SHRA has started work on renewing the nearby bird info board and the SS Barnhill and flora & fauna information boards on the North Harbour beach, and the refurbishment of their stands.



Meeting with PCSO Martin Hylands

Last month, SHRA committee members met with Police Community Support Officer (PCSO) Martin Hylands to discuss local policing issues. Martin has many years experience of policing the Sovereign Harbour area, but, as he pointed out, his 'beat' also includes a much wider area. He thought that anti-social behaviour is not as bad as it used to be, especially in the Harbour and that there are no serious crime problems. He advised that residents should continue to call 101 (or go online <https://www.police.uk/pu/contact-us> and report any issues. The more they are reported, the more likely it is that action will be taken, for example, Public Space Protection Orders could be issued.

We found the meeting useful not only to foster a good relationship with Sussex Police, but also to keep up to date with what's happening and any changing trends, particularly following the demise of the Local Neighbourhood Panel. We will arrange further meetings with Sussex Police so that we can raise and discuss issues of common interest.

End of SHRA Lifetime Membership Cards

In August 2022, SHRA began to use MemberMojo to handle its membership subscriptions. MemberMojo is an on-line membership system that allows residents to join SHRA and have their membership card emailed to them as a PDF which they can store on their phone or print off. Optionally, members can also obtain a new style plastic card.

The new PDF and plastic cards are white and have an annual expiry date printed on them and residents must renew their membership every year in order to have their membership eligibility confirmed and their card updated. This applies to all SHRA members, including those designated as a "Lifetime Member".

All new members pay a £5 annual subscription and are issued with a digital PDF card. If they wish they can pay an additional £5 for an optional plastic card. Designated "Lifetime Members" must also register to obtain a new style PDF card but they don't pay the annual subscription fee, however, they will be charged £5 annually if they choose to have a plastic card.

Now that nearly all our members have been issued with the new style membership cards, we are advising everyone that from 1 September 2023, the old style, dark blue, "Lifetime" membership cards will no longer be valid as proof of membership of SHRA, nor will they be able to be used to obtain discounts. All our discounters have been informed of this change. They will accept the PDF card as proof of membership.

Harbour WI - Meeting Report

54 Members including one new member were welcomed to the July meeting of the Harbour WI. They were introduced to Liz from LizMFitness by Diane Groot-Copp. Liz then led them through 15 minutes of Armchair Aerobics!

Diane next introduced Alec Stephens from [Eastbourne Community First Responders](#). Alec is one of 16 full time volunteer responders, aged from 18 to 80. They are all trained by the Ambulance Service to attend scenes of medical emergencies. These can be anything from breathing problems, to cardiac arrest, to suicide. They respond from home or work when they are on call and they stay with the patient until the ambulance team arrive. Each responder is on call for 20 hours a month and they attend training sessions 2 evenings a month.



Eastbourne has 2 cars that are fully kitted up and each person on duty also has a basic kit. All of this needs constant updating and funding.

The cars alone cost £4,000 a year as well as the mileage paid for using own cars. The defibrillators around Eastbourne are all serviced and looked after by the First Responders.

Alec demonstrated how to use one in an emergency and suggested everyone attend a Heart Beat Life Saving Scheme talk if they get the opportunity. President Jacquie Frost presented Alec with a cheque for £200 for the charity and a bucket was passed around raising another £78. Eastbourne First Responders is one of this year's charities supported by the Harbour.



After tea Diana Beere gave a very amusing account of the day trip to see the Strictly Come Dancing costumes and a visit to Ikea. 42 members went by coach to Croydon. Diane had pictures (see below) of some of the members looking very glamorous in the dresses! The day was organised by Jackie Stevens and was a great success. She told members about a proposed trip to Amberley Living Museum near Arundel in the spring. Columbus Point Water Feature

The anchor shaped Water Feature (known also as “the Fountains”) in the Columbus Point development on the South Harbour is privately owned and paid for by owners of 369 properties surrounding it. It is not owned or managed by Eastbourne Borough Council. Members of the public and other residents are free and welcome to enjoy access to it, even though they do not contribute to its running costs.

There are numerous safety and warning signs around the Water Feature, all of which comply with legal obligations to protect everyone – residents and visitors alike - from the risks that Health & Safety specialists have identified. The Water Feature contains chemicals and during the summer the amount of chemicals used are significantly increased to keep the water from algae growth. Small children should be accompanied closely by adults at all times. There are in-pool jets, fountains and lights, as well as electrical cabling which, if damaged, will lead to expensive repairs. As a body of water, the Water Feature acts as an echo chamber, particularly after dark when the fountains are off, when laughter, shouting, splashing and screams inevitably disturb the residents overlooking it.

This summer there has been a significant increase in antisocial behaviour around the Water Feature, with some property owners being threatened by people of all ages who have refused to accept that the Water Feature is not suitable for swimming and paddling and who feel they have a right to cause disruption, and then brag about it on social media. Whilst the police are always called to incidents where threats occur, they are often unable to respond sufficiently rapidly. However, where an arrest occurs, the management company will press charges, and where damage has been caused, will seek restitution. In the past, damage worth several hundred pounds has occurred and the cost has been recovered.

Finally, we respectfully ask everyone to understand that the Water Feature is not a public facility. Access to it is therefore a privilege, not a right, and to respect the rights of the owners and residents of the development to peace and quiet.

Wing-Walk

Harbour resident and SHRA committee member *Frances Lawrence* recently did a wing-walk flight for charity. Here is her report of the event.

Fortunately the sun was shining although it was windy, but perfect conditions for a wing-walk. This was never really on my bucket list until I was dared at the Eastbourne Airshow last year to do it! I booked through The Wing Walk Company at Headcorn in Kent, and spent my own money to pay for it, as it was important to maximise donations for RNLI Eastbourne. At this point I had raised £1500 with others waiting for me to complete the dare before signing over their hard earned cash. The wing walk was booked for Monday 10th July 2023.

On arrival at the airfield there were quite a few friends already there with picnics and cameras at the ready. They had a birds eye view sitting next to the runway. At that point the first walker sped up the runway looking very pleased with herself and waving to us. So I thought it had to be quite good fun, although she was probably less than half my age! My husband and I walked round to the office and had some lunch on the way. When I saw the pilot I began having second thoughts as he looked older than my 69 years. However, my husband assured me that he would have a lot of experience. I did actually say to the organisers that I thought he was a bit past it and could he see the runway! They reassured me that I would be going with a different pilot. He turned out to be rather lovely, very young and a British Airways pilot - it was a shame I wasn't 50 years younger!



After a safety briefing and a small delay as they were rather busy it was time for me to climb aboard. Literally climbing on the front seat then clambering onto the wing where I was strapped to a framework in a semi-sitting, semi-standing position. You're given earplugs and goggles, told to hold your arms out wide for take off and wave to friends when flying past. If you're not happy it's thumbs down so that the pilot knows to land ASAP.

So we taxied to the runway, revved up the engines and off into the bright blue yonder. It certainly irons out any lines you may have on

your face but what fun! The drag on your shoulders with your arms outstretched is enormous, and you can't move your feet without huge effort. How those girls at Airbourne manage to climb up onto the wing while the plane is in flight is beyond me.

I was really enjoying myself, the pilot could see that too as I waved at my friends and had a huge grin on my face. So we performed lots of swoops, wing wagging up and down, low flying through the trees and generally having a great time. I would have liked to go upside down but that wasn't allowed. The 15 minutes was soon over and I braced myself for a bumpy grass landing, but in fact I didn't feel a thing. What an experience - I would do it all over again.

On Saturday SHYC organised a Pirate Day which, in spite of the weather, was amazing and the children had the best time ever.

The day is best explained by the thank you response to YOU from Trevor Phillips, a trustee of Wetwheels and a club member

“Thank you just doesn’t feel sufficient to explain what a difference the club and the members made to the Wetwheels Pirate Day. With the weather not playing ball we had to go with Plan B which was to stay in the harbour. Obviously, this meant we were unable to give our participants and their families the usual high speed Wetwheels experience, but we still had some amazing feedback with one mother saying, ‘this was the most enjoyable thing we have ever been able to do with our daughter’. Comments like these are always forthcoming with all our Wetwheels trips and really underline the reason why Wetwheels is so important and what a difference your generosity makes to those living with disabilities.

That the day was so enjoyable for all our participants was due to the huge effort made by Gary and Team Well Plumbed and Shane of Kraken RIB Tours dressing up and providing the best possible pirate adventure within the confines of the harbour. For those that did not witness the events, Well Plumbed and Kraken were the ‘bad guys’ attacking the two Wetwheels boats. We decided to give our participants the experience of locking out and then turning around in the Outer Harbour before locking back in and going in search of hidden treasure. The treasure was bags of gold coins that Gary and Shane had dropped in a lobster pot in the North Harbour.

Thank you, Ros, for creating the treasure maps and thanks to Premier Marinas, Eastbourne for turning locks around for us.

Thank you too, Chris (aka Captain Flint) and Annie Brooks for money collecting on the locks.

Water fights a plenty were had on both trips and culminated in the Wetwheels boats defeating the bad guys and returning to the pontoon with the gold coins.

Pan Fried Cod with Ginger & Turmeric served with Rice Noodles & Vegetables

This fish recipe with rice noodles and herbs is inspired by the Vietnamese, in Hanoi where the dish originates, the fish is usually cooked table-side and served with a variety of accompaniments. It is an easy and simple recipe, you can keep the herbs, sauce, and noodles separate, or combine them all in a bowl.

Ingredients

2 tbsp sunflower or olive oil
2 tbsp fish sauce
4 tsp clear honey
2 tsp grated ginger
½ tsp ground turmeric

240g cod fillets

100g noodles

1 tbsp lime juice
1 red chilli, finely chopped

2 cloves garlic, crushed
½ Onion, thinly sliced

Handful of beans and tenderstem
broccoli trimmed and halved
Handful of basil roughly chopped
and basil leaf to garnish



Method

In a mixing bowl, whisk together 1 tbsp fish sauce, 2 tsp honey, the ginger, turmeric and a grinding of black pepper. Add the cod fillets, coating them in the mixture, then cover and set aside for 15 minutes.

Meanwhile, soak the noodles in just-boiled water for 8 minutes, then drain. Rinse with lukewarm water, then toss with a splash of oil to prevent sticking. Shake off as much water as possible and divide between two plates.

In a small bowl, make a sauce by mixing the lime juice with the remaining 1 tbsp fish sauce, 2 tsp honey and the red chilli.

Heat 1 tbsp oil in a large non-stick frying pan over a medium-high heat. Fry the onion, garlic, beans and tenderstem broccoli for 8 minutes until tender and just golden. Place into a bowl, then return the pan to a high heat with a half tbsp oil.

Fry the fish for 2 minutes on each side (don't worry if it breaks up a little), then return the vegetables to the pan with the chopped basil and heat for a final minute, ensuring the fish is opaque, cooked through and will flake easily with a fork.

Pile everything onto the noodles, spoon over the sauce and serve at once.

Visitors are urged to use public transport where possible when visiting the show, and a cycle park is provided free of charge in Howard Square and Wilmington Square.

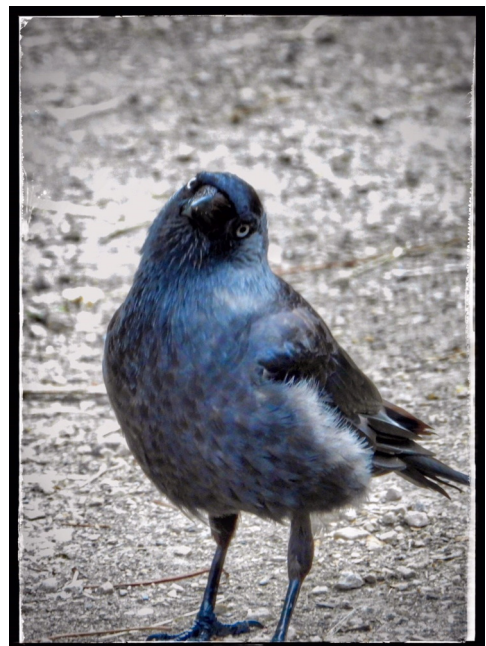
Sovereign Harbour Photo Club

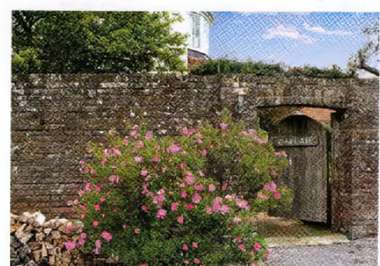
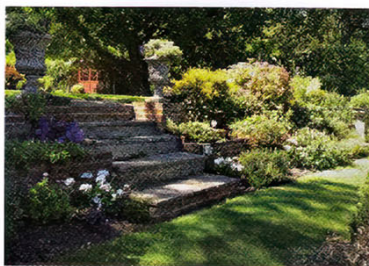
