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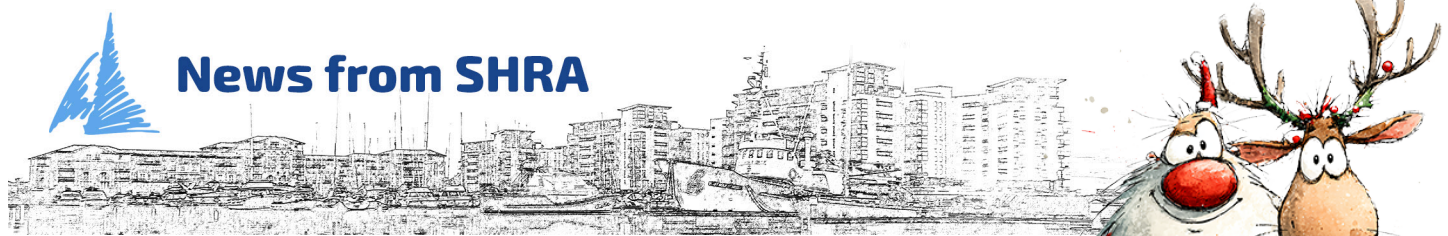
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2025 ROUND-UP

It's been another busy year for the SHRA Committee and our members. We've had ongoing meetings and discussions with the developers of the Aldi, LNT, McCarthy Stone and Untold Living sites, along with the Martello Towers application, which is still ongoing.



SHRA's AGM was held in May at the Sovereign Harbour Community Centre and was well attended with speakers Josh Babarinde OBE MP and Michael Newton-Smith (Director of the Eastbourne U10 Fishermans CIC) giving interesting talks. Next year's AGM will be held on Thursday 14 May 2026, same venue.

We have written to the Wellcome Trust about Premier Marinas Harbour Charge, but unfortunately we have not yet received a response despite a follow-up. Although it may appear we are flogging a dead horse, we will continue to press Premier Marinas for greater transparency on the Harbour Charge costs for the residents who pay it!

Following complaints received from members regarding difficulties communicating with the Sovereign Harbour Trust via their agents Plummer Parsons (who are now part of Galloways Accounting), we intend to raise this matter with the Sovereign Harbour Trust.

We are very grateful for all the attention that MP Josh Babarinde, Ward Councillor Kshama Shore and Eastbourne Borough Council have given to the serious issues with the Water Treatment Works. Southern Water have apologised and have promised that improvement work now taking place will be completed by March 2026. [Southern Water webpage on the issue.....](#)



With regard to the Macaulay Place open space – the developers have acknowledged that, at present, it is their responsibility to maintain the park as it remains unadopted by the council. The park has now been tidied up and waste bins emptied.

The SHRA have re-established their joint meetings with the Ward Councillors and the local PSCOs (Police Community Support Officer) to discuss local issues on a quarterly basis.

We've helped to support the Community Centre in a number of events, most recently their Armistice Day service. This was a well-supported event which will be a permanent fixture at the Community Centre. We would like to take the opportunity to thank the '[Langney Men in Sheds](#)' for their assistance in making the 'Memorial Tree'. We look forward to the Carol Singing event on **23 December, 4pm-6pm**, where residents can leave a 'Memorial Star' for their loved ones on the tree (poster below).

The refurbishment of the Harbour information boards is now complete – please see the separate article regarding this.

We are intending to host a '*Smugglers of East Sussex*' talk in the Yacht Club early in the New Year, date to be advised.

Also for the New Year the SHRA will be keeping any eye on the next stage of the plans for a new unitary authority covering the whole of East Sussex except Brighton and Hove. See separate item below.

We will also wish to engage with the 'We are Eastbourne Initiative' (Neighbourhood Board) who are gathering information from residents on priorities for spending the £20 million in funding from central government awarded to Eastbourne as part of the long-term Pride in Place Programme (PPP). The money is to be spent over the next 10 years on projects across the borough.

Government Consultation on Proposals for a New Council for East Sussex

The Government has launched its consultation on proposals for local government in East Sussex. They are consulting on two options:

- One East Sussex - a single unitary authority based on the existing boundaries of East Sussex, with Brighton & Hove to remain unchanged.
- Five unitary authorities that divide the whole of Sussex into new areas, with parts of East Sussex either moved into Brighton & Hove or into a new shared council with areas of West Sussex.

The consultation asks for views on whether the proposals will create councils that are good value for money, deliver high-quality services, reflect local needs, and support stronger community engagement.

The current East Sussex county council believe that their One East Sussex option offers the best outcomes for our partners and our residents. Developed collaboratively by all district and borough councils in East Sussex, One East Sussex shows that a single unitary authority council, on the existing East Sussex footprint would be simpler for residents, would save £64 million over its first five years and would avoid the extra complexity of splitting up existing services.

The event began at 10am when visitors were invited to hang their dedication poppies on the memory tree; over tea and coffee we learned and spoke about the service men and women we came to remember.

Father Mark McAulay and Christopher Field led the readings and prayers around the memory tree. Mark Ayling from the Salvation Army band led us into the 2 minutes silence with the Last Post. The stillness, broken only by the tinkling of the leaves on the memory tree, was poignant and moving. Iain Shore, Chair of the Centre's Trustees, gave a reading including the words "When you go home, tell them of us and say, for your tomorrow, we gave our today". Mark closed the ceremony with Reveille.



The morning was dry and bright, and we were truly blessed with the support and the memories we shared. We would like to thank everyone who came along and gave so generously; over £200 was donated to the Royal British Legion to help them continue their valuable work.

We would also like to express our sincere appreciation to the Sovereign Harbour Residents Association (SHRA) who sponsored the event, and the brilliant and tenacious chaps at the Langney Shed who created the enduring memory tree which we hope will be visited by the community over the coming years.

The Harbour Information Boards

We're pleased to confirm that the refurbishment of the Harbour information boards are now complete.

The project commenced with our idea of installing a seal information board next to the bird board by the locks. This was done with the help of generous donations from both PCDL and Premier Marinas and of course, our members.

Once this was in place, we felt that the bird board looked shabby alongside the new seal board so we decided to refurbish the bird board. This evolved into a project to refurbish the *SS Barnhill* board and the shingle flora & fauna board on the North Harbour beach.

Many thanks to Peter Lawrence for the manufacture and installation of the new frameworks, and to Frances Lawrence for applying umpteen coats of varnish, Raj Pisavadia for the design of the new inserts and Keith Collier for the hard work of installing the boards. Each board is shown below.



SUSSEX SEALS

INTRODUCTION

Seals are medium-sized sea mammals found in a range of habitats including sandy and rocky beaches, marlflats, rocky shores etc. They are efficient swimmers but on land their movements are limited. Seals have short hairs with a layer of insulating blubber. They have good eyesight and hearing, but whiskers are their most important sense, used for navigation and locating prey. Seals feed on a wide variety of fish, squid and crustaceans.

SEAL IDENTIFICATION

The Common or Harbour seal is the smallest of the two seal species found in Sussex waters. Identified by olive-grey coloration with light patterns, occasionally appear sandy or black. Their ribs can be felt through nostrils. Often seen in harbours, bays and inland near rivers. The Grey seals are larger than the Common Harbour seal and may look more greyish or sandy colored with dark patches and a dog-like face with powerful rostrum. Both species can temporarily have red stained fur due to iron from the water.

HAILING OUT


Hauling out on beaches or harbour mud at low tide and resting there for several hours can be considered part of a seal's life and they need not be fully understood as they roam on its land. A couple of behaviours you may see are the 'Banana' resting posture where the seal's resting body is arched like a banana tail and snout 'Bobbing' in the water, when the seal floats vertically up to its head and snout above the water as a sign of resting in water.

DO NOT DISTURB


Common or Harbour seals are on particular risk of disturbance from humans, dogs and boats. People often mistake a seal looking at them as a positive, when in reality they are watching you as a potential threat. Disturbing the seal can cause them stress and negatively impact their health. Disturbed behaviour can range from the seal rapidly flapping its head, raising its body and head, waving its tail from flippers or just focused looking in your direction. Extreme disturbance may cause the seals to swim off interrupting their essential resting. We want you to enjoy viewing or photographing the seals but please do so from a distance and do not approach them.

SS BARNHILL

The story behind this wreck

On the night of 20 March 1940 the German Air Force (Luftwaffe), carried out its first attack on the British merchant ship, on a British merchant ship, in the English Channel. SS Barnhill was one of the first ships to be sunk in the Channel. It was hit by a single bomb, which caused severe damage to the hull, and the ship was forced to take to the water, carrying 20 crew, and large quantities of cargo and food.

SS Barn Hill was 3 miles south-west of Beachy after a bomb struck and caused her to sink. The ship was listing heavily, and the crew were struggling to stay afloat. The ship was hit by a single bomb, which caused severe damage to the hull, and the ship was forced to take to the water, carrying 20 crew, and large quantities of cargo and food.

REMARKABLE RESCUE

The ship's distress signals were answered by a Dutch vessel, SS Dordrecht, which arrived in response 14 miles. The Eastbourne lifeboat James Hogg launched shortly after the volunteer crew returned a further 100 miles safely to shore. However, it soon came to light that none of the shipwreck's crew had been rescued, and the reason was accounted for, as the ship was not seen.

Meanwhile a salvage tug, the Foresnor, arrived to assist the sinking vessel. Her crew were authorized to suddenly hear the ship's bell ring. Amidst flames shooting to the height of a double-decker bus, they spotted a man lying on the deck. It was the Master of the ship, and two injured to him, he was pulling the bell's cord with his teeth.

By now the lifeboat was on its way back to the SS Barnhill. Volunteer crew members Alce Huggard and John Hogg, who had been on the ship, and the Master, the lifeboat then went to the ship. Alce Huggard and Thomas Alcock, who both volunteered the RNLI (Bristol Medal) for their bravery after the shipwreck, were awarded a Royal Medal of Appreciation.

Eventually rescued, the SS Barn Hill crew travelled 275m south-east of Langney Point where the shipwrecked, in 1940, spilling the remainder of her cargo, much of which provided local residents with a welcome supplement to their war time ration.

At low water you can easily see the bow of the SS Barn Hill, directly ahead of this information board.

WE WILL REMEMBER THEM

The wreck stands as a reminder of the bravery of crew of Eastbourne Lifeboat Station, the fortitude of Captain O'Neill and the sacrifice of men of the Merchant Navy in the Second World War maintaining the crucial lifeline to British shores.

The four fatalities on the SS Barn Hill were amongst 35,000 Merchant Navy personnel who lost their lives during the Second World War, and the vessel was one of 2,426 British registered merchant ships that were sunk.

The RNLI is the charity that saves lives at sea.

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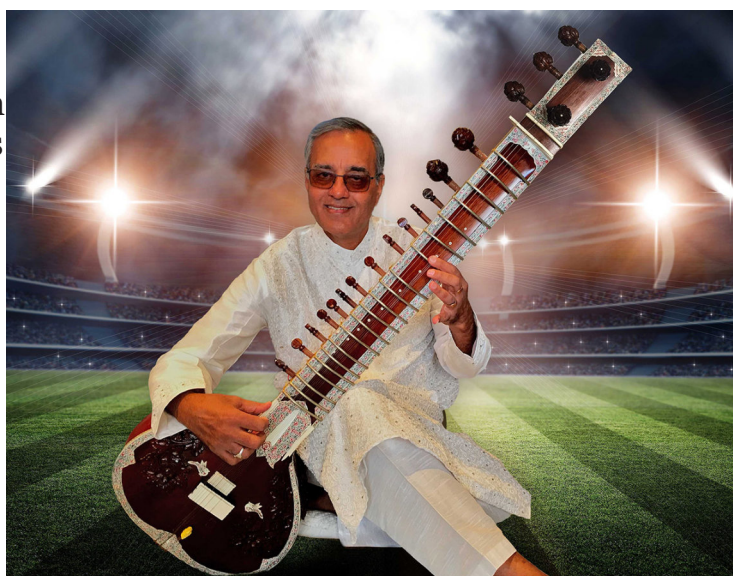

If you've ever seen a shivering figure emerging from the sea at 8am, that was probably me. I swim with the Harbour Dolphins — yes, by choice — despite being born in Mombasa, Kenya, where the water is warm and the sea is gentle. Somehow, life has brought me back to the coast again, since leaving beautiful East Africa in 1968; only this time the cold waters of the English Channel bites back a little!

My early working life was in the printing and pre-press industry, producing well-known magazines and later running my own photography and media business. Music has always been close to my heart too — I play the Indian instruments sitar and dilruba, continuing a family tradition. My uncle performed playing the dilruba with George Harrison for the Beatles' *Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band* album, on the track 'Within you Without You', so there's a little music history in the family, although I'm still the one responsible for tuning the instruments.



Later in life I moved into Mental Health Care, as an OT Technician, working in both private and NHS hospitals in Wales and later here in Sussex. I worked in forensic and recovery settings, supporting people in rebuilding confidence, identity and purpose. It was meaningful and rewarding work, and I continued in the NHS until my retirement in 2022.

Life, of course, has included challenges. I was diagnosed with cancer while raising young children and running a business back in South Wales where we lived for 35 years— a frightening and uncertain time. With treatment, support and a determination to stay positive, I made it through. That experience changed how I saw the world. I don't take life for granted. Now I swim, walk, cycle, practice yoga and meditation, and travel when I can — appreciating the everyday moments.

Sovereign Harbour has been good for me. I enjoy the community here and I had the pleasure of designing the harbour information boards about the seals, birds and the SS Barnhill — small contributions to help people learn about and appreciate our shared surroundings.

I'm also part of the Sovereign Harbour Photographic Club, which lets me combine my love of creativity with getting to know others who see the world through a lens (sometimes literally)!

I also seem to have become the unofficial caretaker for a few neighbours and second-home apartments — I'm still not entirely sure how that role found me, but it seems to fit!

I also serve on the Chatsworth Stand Leasehold Association. Sovereign Harbour is not just where I live, it is a place that feels connected to everything I've been through — the sea, resilience, community, and a sense of coming home (usually with a towel and a hot drink after a swim).

Cooking with Faz Razeen

Duck in Orange Sauce (prepared in an air fryer)

Easy air fryer half a duck, crispy, juicy, and perfect for a delicious lunch or dinner during Christmas. This is my easiest recipe with few ingredients and includes a tasty orange juice and red wine marinade, and it is simple to prepare.

Ingredients

Half a pre-cooked duck
½ teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon black pepper

Marinade

⅓ cup red wine
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
1 tablespoon soy sauce
1 orange (squeeze fresh juice)

Instructions

Pour all marinade ingredients in a marinade bag or a suitable plastic food container, and add the pre-cooked half duck. Shake well and then store in the fridge for at least over an hour (better overnight).

Preheat air fryer, meanwhile remove duck from the marinade and prick duck skin with a sharp knife, cover with salt and pepper.

Place the duck in the air fryer basket, cook skin side up for 20 minutes at 190c, extending it by a couple of minutes if necessary.

Rest the duck for a few minutes before serving to allow the juices to redistribute.

Serve with your own choice of vegetables.

Note: For raw duck, use the same method to marinade as above; consider a longer cooking time of 30 minutes or more at 200c, flipping halfway through.

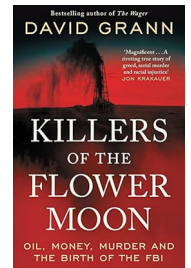


Sovereign Harbour Book and Creative Writing Group

October's book choice was *Killers of the Flower Moon*. As a piece of fiction, it would have made an impressive fantasy. Sadly, it was a true story of abuse of native Americans on an industrial scale. They were cheated out of their incomes and lived in fear for their lives, with a long string of murders. The situation was one of the reasons for creating the FBI, but even when those responsible for the crimes came to court, the punishments for the guilty parties were derisory.



We moved on to the writing topic of 'Sailing'. This led, as it regularly does, to some imaginative interpretations in both prose and poetry.

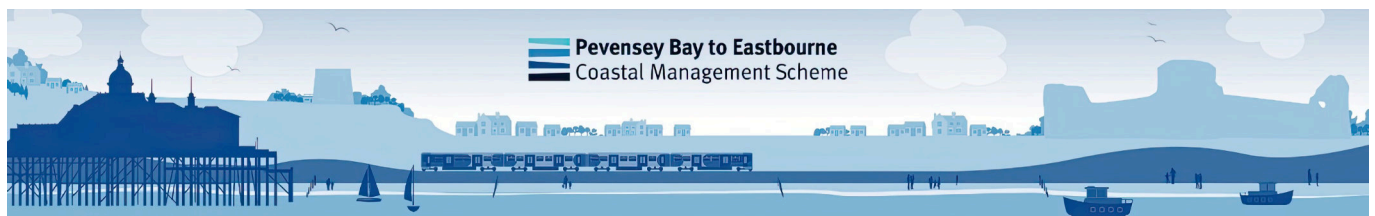
For the November meeting we returned to an interesting period of English history as we read and discussed *Cider With Rosie*, the well known book by Laurie Lee. This was the story of growing up in the countryside in Gloucestershire. It recounted the story of a way of rural life that has long disappeared. A village that lived as an independent community related by the author as his poetic descriptions recalled his infancy, childhood and adolescence as well as the friends and family with whom he interacted. As ever, the book met with a mixed reception, but undeniably, it was food for thought.

For the writers among us, we were writing about 'Bookworm'. Yet again, another great variety of stories and poetry. Some of our number, unsurprisingly, had long had a reputation as bookworms while others spun stories with a more liberal interpretation. It made for another entertaining morning. We even finished off with a play reading. This was the work of one of our members, and in spite of squeezing it into the last few minutes of the session, it became a very enjoyable finale.

Change to Coastal Management Scheme

We want to let you know about a recent change in how we are planning for the future of the coastline. As a result of the changes, the stakeholder workshops we had planned for this winter will not go ahead.

Context: The Government's recent Spending Review has committed over £4 billion nationally for building and maintaining flood and coastal defences between April 2026 and March 2029. The focus for this period is on projects that can deliver better protection for communities within those three years. Locally, this means we are prioritising delivery of projects which better protect communities while beginning early development work for the next phase (post 2037).

This also means funding is no longer available to continue developing the long-term strategy we had originally planned. However, this change does not mean any extra risk to our communities.

Our short- and medium-term projects for both Pevensey and Eastbourne remain fully funded, allowing us to maintain and improve defences until 2037. Planning for our medium-term Phase 1 project continues without interruption, and early development work for Phase 2 (delivery of works starting in 2037) is already underway.

Phase 2 will be a large and complex scheme. We are requesting funds from Government to commence this work, which could take up to two years to secure, followed by around ten years of appraisal and design. Partnership and collaboration will be at the heart of making this project a success, and we look forward to continuing to work with you as plans progress.

Thank you for your ongoing support and engagement. We'll keep you updated and share opportunities to get involved as plans progress. If you have any questions, please do let me know.

Beach Work Update

Our team is working hard to protect the local area from coastal flooding. This includes everything from day-to-day beach management, to updating the beach design for 2027 and securing government funding for long-term coastal protection.

In this issue, we're focusing on what matters most to many of you: what's been happening on the beach.

Beach management

Right now, machinery is reshaping the beach, reprofiling the shingle to maintain a wide crest. At the same time, we are recycling shingle - moving material to where it's needed most to strengthen the beach as a flood defence. These essential works will continue throughout the winter as part of our ongoing coastal management. Last week we started bypassing material from west to east around Sovereign Harbour; you may have noticed the lorries on the roads. We expect this to continue into the first week of December.

In November, exceptionally high spring tides caused significant erosion around the Martello Tower to the east of Sovereign Harbour (photo right).

Normally, our team works between 7:00 am and 7:00 pm, but the timing of low tide and the scale of the erosion meant we had to start earlier to recover shingle before the tide came back in.

We know this may have caused some disruption, and we thank you for your understanding. While we aim to stick to normal hours, severe weather or heightened flood and erosion risk may mean early starts or extended working times to protect the area.

To keep everyone safe, we are monitoring vehicle speeds on the beach and have reinforced the 10-mph limit with all operators. Where possible, bulldozers will travel along the bottom of the beach, and if that's not feasible, they will travel at a very slow speed.

Christmas

Over the Christmas period, a small team will be on standby in case severe weather requires action. Otherwise, normal activities will resume after the holidays.

Report of November's WI Meeting.

Despite the atrocious weather there was a good turnout for the November meeting of the Harbour WI. President Diane Beere welcomed 60 members.

The speaker, Robin Keyte gave a talk on a local wreck, the VOC Amsterdam. The wreck lies on the beach at Bulverhythe near Hastings and can be seen at low tide. It was wrecked on its maiden voyage to Batavia [now Jakarta] in 1749 during a violent storm.

VOC was the Dutch East Indies Company and was the world's largest trade and shipping company in the 17th and 18th centuries. They traded all over the world with their fleet of over 150 ships.

VOC Amsterdam had left the shipbuilder's yard in Amsterdam with Captain Willem Klump at the helm, to pick up a cargo in Texel (one of the Dutch Wadden Islands, off the coast of the Netherlands). The cargo was worth millions of pounds in today's money. They also took on 126 soldiers, 5 women passengers and a crew of 198.

After three false starts they finally set sail in January 1749 but with sickness on board and storm force winds they made very slow progress. After two weeks battling against the stormy winds, the captain decided to shelter in Pevensey Bay but smashed the rudder off as it was too shallow. They continued for 3 more days with no steering before beaching the ship off Hastings.

Even though Bulverhythe was a sparsely populated area in the 17/18th century, thousands of people arrived on the beach in the hope of looting. The army were called in and took 27 chests of silver gilders and ingots to the Bull Inn for safe keeping - but one had disappeared!

There were no casualties but 55 bodies were buried in the cemetery of St. Clements Church in Bulverhythe. They were thought to have died of Yellow Fever. The soldiers and crew were sent back to Holland and Captain Willem Klump continued his career for many more years.

It is possible to walk round the protected wreck site at very low spring tides. It is still Dutch property and believed to have a hold full of precious goods! A replica of the vessel was completed in 1990 and is moored in Amsterdam
