The Annual Rentcharge

The SHRA has received responses from both Premier and the Sovereign Harbour Trust addressing some of the points raised in our letters of December 22nd 2025. A planned meeting with Premier to discuss our concerns further was unfortunately postponed and we're pursuing a new date.

The Sovereign Harbour Trust and the Sovereign Harbour (Sea Defences) Community Interest Company (CIC) now has a vacancy for a stakeholder and homeowner director and we have asked when details of the recruitment process will be announced.

Maris View Care Home

We've had meetings with the Maris View care home management to discuss sponsorship and membership of the SHRA for their residents. We also had a guided tour of Maris View – it's a lovely place. We asked if we could reserve rooms for our future use!

Fishermans Quay

We continue to monitor the tidiness of the Fishermans Quay area. There was a marked improvement, but recently it has become more untidy again. We continue to work with our Fisherman's Quay contacts to achieve further and lasting improvement.

Missing Bus Stops

We've had confirmation from Stagecoach that EBC removed bus stops from Pacific and Atlantic Drives as part of an Eastbourne-wide replacement with new digital stops. Stagecoach confirmed that the stops are still in use.

McCauley Place Open Space

We've been in correspondence with EBC regarding the poor condition of the open space at McCauley Place, but we still await a positive outcome.



Site 1 Update - Untold Living's plan for their retirement complex on Site 1 has moved a step closer with these two minor planning decisions made by EBC last month. All the planning conditions, with the exception of those relating to ecology, have now been formally signed off. Untold have informed us that their planning consultant is in contact with the case officer to enquire when they might expect discharge of the conditions relating to the ecology.

They also informed us that, having had further dialogue with the Building Safety Regulator, this week they made a re-submission of their application for a Gateway 2 approval under the Building Safety Act, so now wait to hear from them further. That could take up to three months.

EBC Consultation on Draft Eastbourne Local Plan

The EA's Perspective on Sea Defence Charge

In March, our Member of Parliament, Josh Babarinde OBE MP secured the opportunity to raise the matter of our sea defence charges directly with the Minister on the floor of the House of Commons. This marked the third time he had raised this issue in Parliament over the past six months. As we reported in [the previous edition of *Waterlines*](#), several members of the SHRA committee attended Parliament to watch the debate

Since then, Josh has been in contact with the **Environment Agency** executives to seek their view on the current arrangement. See their full response below.

Dear Josh

Thank you for sharing your concerns, and those of local residents, regarding the Sovereign Harbour Marina charge. I recognise this is a complex and sensitive issue, and I appreciate you taking the time to raise it with us.

I have responded to your questions below and hope this provides greater clarity on the purpose of the marina charge and the Environment Agency's role.

What is the Environment Agency's perspective on this arrangement?

The arrangement is set out in a legal agreement affecting approximately 3,000 properties at Sovereign Harbour. Residents pay the Sovereign Harbour Trust as part of their wider "annual service charge". This includes a contribution to the wider Pevensy Eastbourne coastal management scheme as well as the typical maintenance costs of a leaseholder. The legal basis is set in the 2001 Sovereign Harbour Beaches Sea Defence Deed which is clear that it must be paid in perpetuity, with residents being made aware of this by their conveyancing solicitor at the point of purchase.

The construction of the Harbour has had and continues to have, a widespread impact on the natural coastal processes. As a result, ongoing intervention is required to bypass shingle around the harbour rock arms and to maintain sea defences along the eastern frontage of Sovereign Harbour, where increased scour and accelerated shingle loss occur due to the harbour structure.

These activities are becoming increasingly complex and costly, particularly as the effects of climate change intensify. However, they remain essential to reducing flood and coastal erosion risk - not only for residents within Sovereign Harbour, but also for neighbouring communities such as Pevensy Bay.

Does the Environment Agency already receive central funding for this frontage?

Yes, we receive funding from central government through Flood Defence Grant in Aid for the wider Pevensy frontage, which extends from Sovereign Harbour to Cooden Beach covering approximately 8.7 km.

Maintaining this frontage currently costs in the region of £5 million per year.

The Sovereign Harbour charge contributes just under £500,000 annually. This represents around 10% of the total funding for the frontage and relates to a section accounting for approximately 14% of its length (the 1.4 km eastern frontage of Sovereign Harbour).

While central funding plays a significant role, the Sovereign Harbour contribution remains an important and proportionate part of the overall funding model. It helps to reflect the additional pressures placed on this section of coastline as a direct result of the harbour's construction and its ongoing impact on coastal processes.

What resources does the Environment Agency commit to maintaining sea defences in this area?

The Environment Agency commits significant and ongoing operational resources to maintain effective coastal flood defences at Sovereign Harbour.

For example, in 2025, a further 27,000 m³ of imported beach material was placed along the eastern frontage via offshore dredging. This work is essential to maintaining beach levels and reducing flood risk.

In addition, our routine operations across the wider Pevensy frontage, including Sovereign Harbour, require a range of specialist equipment and skilled personnel. This includes excavators, articulated dump trucks, tipper lorries, bulldozers, and trained banksmen to ensure safe working practices on a public beach.

This is a large-scale, carefully managed operation carried out in a live environment. It requires significant coordination and expertise to maintain the effectiveness of the defences while always ensuring the safety of both the public and operational teams.

I fully appreciate that this issue is of considerable importance to residents, and we understand why it may give rise to concern. The Environment Agency is committed to being as transparent as possible about how these arrangements operate and why they are necessary to manage coastal risk effectively.

We will continue to work closely with partners and stakeholders to ensure that the coastline is managed in a way that is both sustainable and proportionate, while keeping affected communities informed. Our Project Lead, Nick Gray, will be attending the Eastbourne Regeneration & Investment Plan Launch on Friday and would be happy to discuss any further questions you may have.

The letter from the EA gives some clarity about the beach work, but SHRA will continue to seek greater transparency and more details of all the costs and charges that together, in one form or another, make up the annual rentcharge paid by the majority of Sovereign Harbour residents.

No, no, no! This is not the Christmas Story being brought to you to give you psychological relief from these record- breaking hot days we have been experiencing recently.

However, the fact I bring you good news is very true. Recently SHRA was invited to attend a presentation by Eastbourne Neighbourhood Board (ENB). The presentation was the Eastbourne Regeneration & Investment Plan Launch. Thus it was that on Friday 29th May 2026 I found myself amongst many of the ‘The Great and Good’ of Eastbourne attending this function in the delightful venue of Hillbrow Health and Wellbeing in the Meads area.

Richard Garland, Chair of ENB, spoke generally about the amazingly good fortune of Eastbourne, having been one of the towns selected to receive a grant from the Government to enable us to make huge improvements over a wide range of facilities and services in the Town, as part of the long-term [Pride in Place Programme \(PPP\)](#) (previously named Plan for Neighbourhoods (PfN)). Our hard-working MP, Josh Babarinde, also spoke along similar lines.

This grant is for the amazing sum of £20 million and will be released over the next ten years – starting now!

The second part of this brilliant news is that the controlling and overseeing the way in which this money is distributed will be in the hands of ENB. I believe this is massively beneficial to us, the residents of Eastbourne, because each of the members of ENB bring to the table their respective knowledge and experience, making them a formidable group, not only well qualified to act in our interests but committed to doing so.

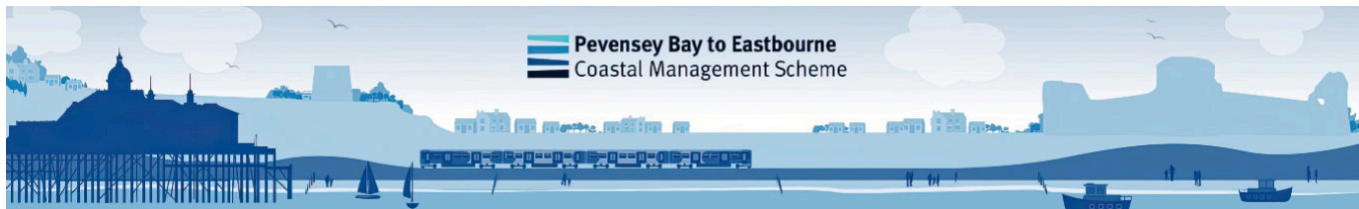

Pevensey Bay to Eastbourne Coastal Management Scheme. What's been happening and what's next

Short-term (2025-2027):

As the winter season draws to a close, it's clear this has been one of the busiest years on record. With the *Sospan Dau* recharge, Eastbourne shingle bypass and the Hastings shingle trial having added more than 37,000 m³ of material to the Pevensey Bay area. Over time, this shingle will gradually move east providing benefit across the entire frontage.

Alongside this, the recycling team has been working across the frontage, moving material to areas affected by earlier storm events. As we enter the official bathing season, the team has also reduced steep areas of the beach to improve access to the foreshore.

Safety works are underway on the timber structures, with our team removing any loose parts and exposed bolts. We will continue to monitor the beach as usual through regular surveys.

Over the summer, ground investigation surveys will take place at various locations. You can find more details below and on our website.

Medium-term (2027 – 2037):

The medium-term project is now in the detailed design stage – the final phase before construction begins. We are around halfway through this stage and will submit the full business case later this year, with construction planned to start in 2027. The design focuses on creating a more resilient Pevensey Bay to Eastbourne frontage.

This approach has been shaped by a comprehensive assessment of three key coastal flood risks: breaching, wave over-topping and coastal erosion. We have tested the design using advanced modelling to simulate 540 storm scenarios across Pevensey and Eastbourne. We will be hosting a series of public engagement events later this year to share the design in more detail – keep an eye on our website and social media for updates.

Alongside this design work, ground investigations are now underway and will continue over the summer. We are inspecting groynes and other sea defences below the surface and assessing ground conditions to help inform future refurbishment and maintenance. Work will focus on key groynes along the beach, but access to the seafront will remain open as normal. We will share regular updates on locations and timings as the works progress via our website and social media.

During this work, we will operate from a temporary site compound in the Sovereign Harbour West car park, alongside our existing depot in Pevensey.

Long-term (future phases from 2037):

In our last update, we shared the success of our community survey, which received over 1,000 responses. To build on this, we now want to ensure we hear from people of all ages as plans continue to develop. Through the Coastal Schools Partnership, we are working with local schools to run pupil-led surveys, helping us understand how young people see coastal change and the coastline they will inherit.

We have recently visited Bexhill Sixth Form College to meet A-level Geography students. We introduced the Scheme and explored how existing data and technical studies could support their Non-Examined Assessment (NEA) coursework, using real-world coastal management as a case study.

We will continue to share updates as this work progresses, along with the technical studies supporting future phases.

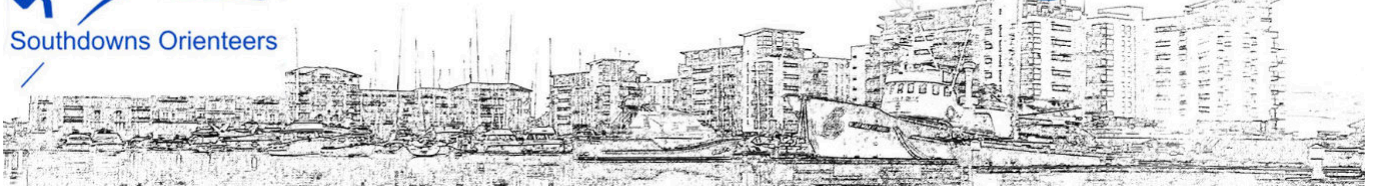

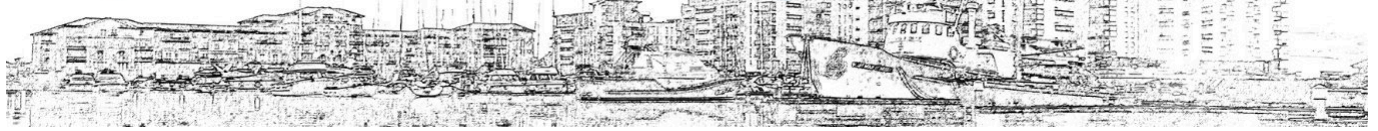

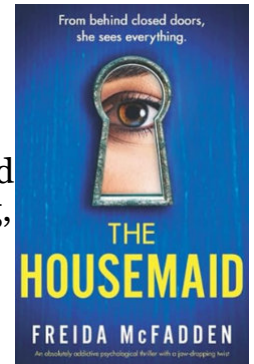
Sovereign Harbour Book and Creative Writing Group



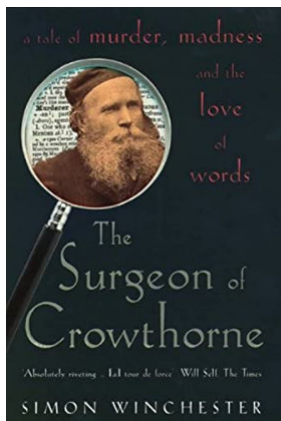
The group holds regular meetings in the morning of the third Friday of every month in the Yacht Club. Good-natured lively literary discussion guaranteed.

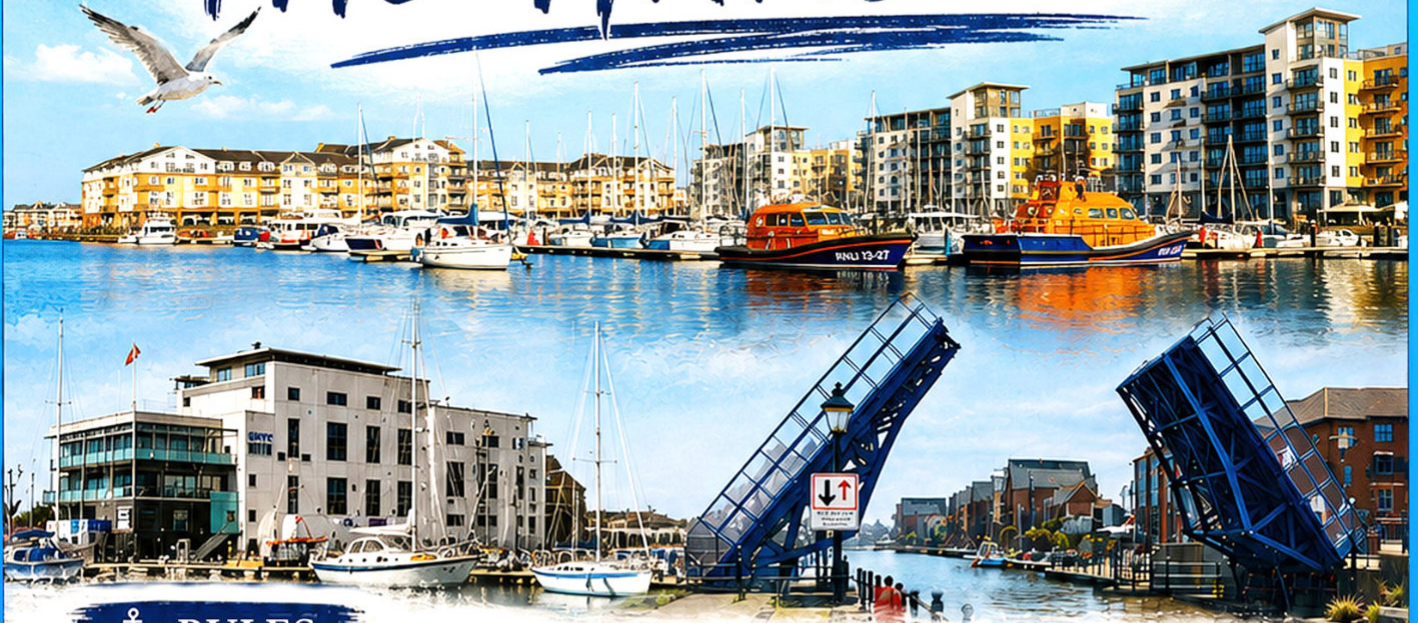

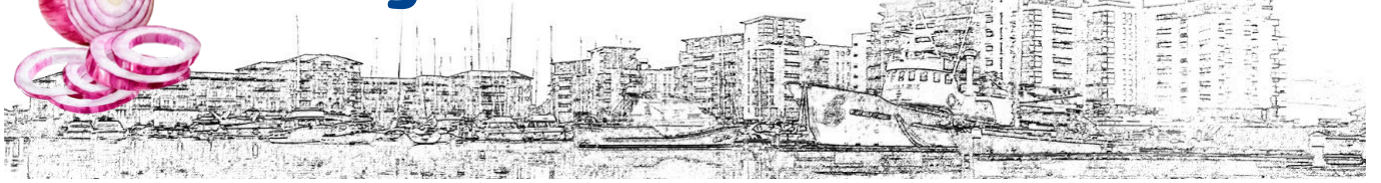

Cooking with Faz Razeen



Spicy Moroccan Cod & Prawn Tagine

This spicy Moroccan cod and prawn tagine is a quick, aromatic dish often ready in under 30 minutes, featuring cod and prawns, and a vibrant, spiced tomato sauce. Always you may add any other white fish of your choice or alternatively if you prefer just use prawns.

Ingredients

140g Cod fillets (cut into small pieces) and
150g prawns

1 small red or white onion (finely chopped)

1 carrot (peeled/sliced into rounds)

2 cloves garlic (minced)

2 large tomatoes roughly chopped

5cm fresh ginger root (peeled/crushed)

1 teaspoon chilli flakes

1 teaspoon ras el hanout

½ teaspoon of paprika

½ teaspoon of cumin

100ml fish stock

1 lemon

Instructions

1. Heat the olive oil in a large pan over medium heat. Fry the onion, garlic, and ginger for roughly 5 minutes until soft.

2. Add the carrot, chilli, and tomatoes to the pan. Simmer gently with the lid on for about 10 minutes until the carrots start to soften.

3. Stir in the ground coriander, paprika, and cumin, ras el hanout - cook for 3–4 minutes to release their flavours.

4. Add the cod and prawns. Pour in the stock, cover the seafood, and let it simmer gently for 6–7 minutes until the cod is opaque and flakes and the prawns are pink.

Finish

Stir in the olives, season with salt and lemon juice, and garnish with fresh coriander. Serve with rice or couscous.

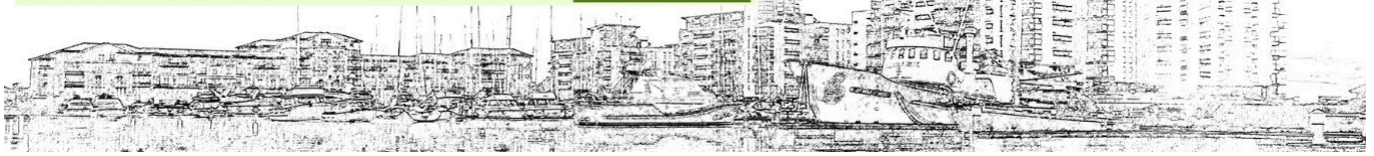

Before that women would wear chemises made of lightweight calico and stays that finished below the bust.



Underwear has changed through the ages; mostly with the fashion of the day, as Naomi illustrated with her slides. There were crinolines and bustles and corsets and stays – all intended to alter the shape of the outerwear. Naomi also brought along her extensive collection of antique underwear for everyone to admire, and even try on if they wanted!

Council invites views on Carpet Gardens planting in new survey

Residents, visitors and businesses are being invited to have their say in a new survey about planting styles at the Carpet Gardens. The independent survey will run until Sunday, August 31.



In summer 2025, a new sustainable style of planting was introduced within the Carpet Gardens as a one-year showcase. This was designed to create an attractive, year-round display, and to better withstand the increasingly wet, hot and dry conditions experienced on the seafront, while also supporting wildlife.

Alongside the new planting, one section of the Carpet Gardens has remained in the traditional summer bedding style, allowing people to compare the two approaches side by side. The traditional scheme has been in place for many years, delivering displays in spring and summer but requiring plants to be replaced twice a year, at significant cost and with no real benefits for biodiversity.
